



Shared Parenting Polling, Georgia, 2021


In August, 2021 National Parents Organization, in coordination with United Georgia Families, commissioned an independent poll, conducted by Researchscape International, of the attitudes of those in Georgia concerning shared parenting when parents live apart. In instances of divorce or separation:


92% of those in Georgia believe it is in the child's best interest ... to have as much time as possible with each parent;"

94% of Georgians expressed a commitment to vote their beliefs being "more likely to vote for a candidate who supports children spending equal or nearly equal time with each parent ...when both parents are fit and willing to be parents."

Influence on Voting




- It is in the child's best interest to have as much time as possible with each parent.

- Less likely


87% of those in Georgia indicated they would support a change in Georgia law that awards children as much time as possible with each parent after divorce or separation.

Change in Georgia Law




80% believe that when there is conflict between parents, awarding sole custody to one parent increases conflict.

Parental Conflict and Sole Custody




92% believe that Georgia should promote shared parenting for all children with separated parents.

Data based on a professional poll conducted by [Researchscape International](https://www.researchscape.com/) August 25 through September 1 2021. The sample size of 556 respondents, representative of Georgia adults with respect to race, gender, age, income, political alignment and more, provides an estimated credibility interval of plus or minus 6%.
